Alvin Saunders, Son of Gunnell Saunders, Was Appointed 1st Governor of Nebraska

The following story was submitted by Susan Saunders, 1267 N. 4469th Rd, Earlville, IL 60518-6124, in response to the following entry in the January 1998 *Siftings*: "Mary Angeline Saunders (1861-1944) married 9 Jan 1884 in Omaha, Neb., to Russell Benjamin Harrison (1854-1936), son of Benjamin Harrison, 24th President of the United States." Mary Angeline was the daughter of Alvin Saunders.

ALVIN SAUNDERS was born 12 July 1817 in Fleming Co., Ky. to Gunnell and Mary Margaret Saunders. Around 1828 Gunnell and Mary Saunders followed their older son, Jonathon, to Sangamon Co., Ill. Bringing the rest of their family, they settled north of the present town of Springfield, Ill.

Alvin remained at home until around 1836 when he followed his brother, Presley Saunders, to Henry Co., Iowa. to the small town of Mt. Pleasant which Presley founded.

Alvin worked first on a farm then he worked as a clerk in a small dry goods store. He felt his education limited him so he attended school to improve himself. Later he became the first postmaster of Mt. Pleasant, a job he held for seven years. He also became a partner with his brother Presley in the mercantile business.

He was elected a state senator in Iowa and served from 1854 to 1858. He was a member of the Constitutional Convention of Iowa, under which Iowa was admitted to the union. He was a delegate to the first Republican Convention of Iowa which met 22 Feb 1856.

Alvin Saunders married Marthena Barlow in Washington, D.C. 11 Mar 1856. Marthena was born 24 Oct 1834 in Greencastle, Ind. She was a niece of Senator Harlan's wife. Senator and Mrs. Harlan's daughter married Robert Lincoln.

Alvin and Marthena had two chil-

dren, Charles Leonard (b. 23 Dec 1856/57) and Mary A. (b. 16 Nov 1860). Charles Leonard never married. Mary married Russell H. Harrison, son of President Benjamin Harrison.

In 1860, Alvin was a delegate to the National Republican Convention that nominated Abraham Lincoln. He and Mr. Lincoln were acquainted from Sangamon Co., Ill. During Alvin's second term as state senator in Iowa, President Lincoln appointed him Governor of the Nebraska Territory, a position he held for six years. He was the one to announce statehood for Nebraska on 27 March 1867.

When Saunders was appointed Governor, Nebraska was in debt equaling two dollars per head. When Nebraska was admitted to the union and Gov. Saunders retired, there were sufficient funds in the treasury to pay off all debts, including Nebraska's quota of troops to suppress the "great slaveholders' rebellion."

After retiring from the office of governor, Alvin Saunders took up banking, becoming president of the State National Bank in Omaha, Nebraska.

He lived in Omaha until his death on 1 November 1899.

Additional Family Information

Further information on the family of Alvin Saunders' parents: GUNNELL SAUNDERS (b. 27 Jul 1783, d. 26 Oct 1848) married MARY MARGARET MAUZY (b. 15 Apr 1784, d. 18 Oct 1851) on 1 Apr 1801. They had seven children: Jonathon R. (b. 17 Feb 1802), Nancy (b. 1804), Presley (b. 1808), Frances (b. 18 Apr 1809), George M. (b. 6 Oct 1811), Alvin (b. 12 Jul 1817), and William A., (b. 4 Sep 1819).

Gunnell Saunders served in the Joseph C. Betts Co., Pogue Regiment, in the War of 1812. He was born in Loudoun Co., Va. ■

William Sanders, Orphaned At Age 12, Gives His Account of Moving With Kin To Texas

WILLIAM SANDERS, (prob.) son of John and Mary Jane (Smith) Sanders was born in 1834 in Bedford Co., Tenn. When he was about 12 years of age his parents passed away (1846). So he went to Fayette Co., Ala., to live with his older brother Isaac Sanders. It was there that he first met my mother, Jane Smith, and in about 1852 they were married.

My mother was the daughter of Amos and Rachel (Wheeler) Smith. They had immigrated from Spartenburg, S.C. (where my mother was born) to Fayette Co., Ala., when she was about six or eight years of age (1838-40). I have heard my mother mention her grandmother, Elizabeth McMakin, but her people immigrated to Missouri in the 1840s or 1850s. All my brothers and sisters were born in Fayette Co., Ala., with the exception of Sister Lou who was born in Chickasaw Co., Miss.

My father was a farmer and tilled the soil, but when the war broke out in 1861 he enlisted in the 23rd Alabama Infantry under Capt. Isaac Sanders, his brother. He was a drummer boy and was under Gen. Robert E. Lee. In the latter part of the war, my father was wounded in the thigh, but succumbed to smallpox in the hospital, in Richmond, Va., in 1865.

After Father's death, Grandfather Amos Smith sent his two sons, Joel and Thomas Smith in two wagons and three or four Negro boys and moved us to Chickasaw Co., Miss. (near Okolona) where he was living at that time. We had four or five head of cattle and about the same in sheep. I recall making the trip and we reached the "Buttahachee River" (a tributary of the Tombigbee). Our sheep became frightened and left our flat boat and swam across ahead of the boat to the shore. We rounded them up and proceeded on our way.

Later on we came to the Tombigbee River and it was here that Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest fought the battle of the "Prairie." I remember hearing the guns of battle and seeing lots of dead horses and dark spots on the ground and we picked up lead bullets on the battlefield. We were directed down the river for safety reasons. This must have been in the fall of 1864 or the spring of 1865.

We settled near Grandfather Amos Smith and stayed there until the fall of 1870 when we decided to immigrate to Texas. We all met at Uncle James Smith's home (Grandfather's son) who lived nearby and on my birthday (Oct 13, 1870) we left for Texas. It was a great thrill for me to be going to Texas (although I was only nine years of age).

Our caravan consisted of seven ox wagons. Our wagon included Mother and us kids—sister Mary -Margaret, brother James, myself, and sister Lou. My sister Rachel was married to George R. Pearson and he had one wagon in the caravan. Also Simeon and Monroe Pearson (all brothers) each had a wagon. (They had married Mother's sisters.) We were on the road about seven weeks, crossing the Mississippi River at Helena, Ark., through Pine Bluff and entering Texas at Texarkana. Our wagon and George Pearson's wagon (my brother-in-law) stopped at Clarksville, Texas, for about a week or two, as he (George Pearson) hired out to haul logs to the saw mill. The rest of the caravan proceeded on to Lamar Co., Texas, (near Paris). We later joined them near Paris. This was about the first of December, 1870.

I remember a man on horseback asking us where we were from and where we were going. I answered him back very eagerly that we were going to Texas. He replied that we were already in Texas, but I said that we wasn't in Texas yet. He asked me why I didn't think that I was in Texas. I said because I said in Texas they have "Honey Ponds and Flitter Trees" and I hadn't seen any yet, so I knew I wasn't in Texas. But he replied that there were no "Honey Ponds and Flitter Trees" in Texas. I was heart broken. My spirits were at a low ebb and I was ready to turn back to Mississippi.

We settled in Lamar Co., Texas, as we had former friends from Mississippi that had preceded us to Texas. In 1870-73 we lived in Lamar Co., 1873-76 in Delta County, 1876-77 in Fannin County, back in Lamar County in 1877-79, 1879-1882 in Denton County, and in 1882-1897 to Comanche County. In 1897 Mother and sister Lou moved to Bowie in Montague Co., Texas, where sister Margaret was living. She married Benjamin Franklin Wilhite near Honey Grove, Texas, in 1879 and had moved to Bowie in 1885.

Who Would Like To Claim Kin To This George and Levi Sanders?

This account of a robbery in Indian Territory was found in the *Obituaries of Benton Co., Ark., Vol. I - 1884-1898* by Sherry Healy of Chatsworth, Calif.

Would someone like to claim kin to the George and Levi Sanders in this story?

"Ft. Smith, Ark., March 28.- Sam McWilliams and George Sanders were killed at 8 o'clock this morning while robbing T.J. Madden's store at Bragg, a small town on the railroad, nine miles east of Fort Gibson. Joe Morris, clerk for Madden, was shot through the abdomen and fatally injured. Sam Butler, the only member of the gang to escape, is thought to be wounded.

"Butler, McWilliams and Sanders rode into the town and before Deputy Marshal Barbee knew who they were, had covered him with Winchesters and disarmed him. All citizens they met were then driven to Madden's store and McWilliams and Sanders went inside while Butler remained on guard at the door.

"They took things leisurely and picked out such goods as they wanted. Each had a suit apiece and the two inside were picking out gloves when Butler warned them of the approach of Johnson Manning and Hiram Stevens, two Indian deputy sheriffs. They ran to the door and Butler fired first, killing Manning's horse. The two parties then fired a volley almost simultaneously and McWilliams fell dead, shot through the center of the breast. Sanders and Butler retreated toward their horses keeping up a steady fire. Barbee ran between the two deputies and the outlaws secured McWilliams' Winchester and took part in the fight.

"Half way to the horses Sanders fell with a bullet hole in his temple and several wounds on his body. Butler reached his horse and made good his escape. During the fight one of the outlaws shot Morris.

"T.J. Madden was at home and started to make a fight himself but his wife insisted that he go after the officers, who lived about a mile away.

"The bodies were brought here at noon and turned over to Marshal Crump as the Government offers a reward of \$250 for McWilliams, dead or alive. Bill Cook was brought up to see the bodies and laying his hand affectionately upon

the box where his former comrade lay, said: 'This is the Kid.' Sam McWilliams was best known as 'Verdigris Kid,' and was almost an inseparable companion of Jim French last year. The two left a long and bloody trail after them. He was only 19 years old. Sanders was older, about 25, and had always been a desperado though he only lately joined McWilliams. Last fall he robbed U.S. Drake at McKay by holding a revolver at his babe's head and threatening to kill it if he did not give up money.

"He was a brother of Levi Sanders who robbed the Fort Gibson mail hack, killed a woman and was himself killed near Tahlequah last summer." [*Benton County Democrat* 4/4/1895] ■

Do You Have Connection To The William Sanders Who Changed Name To Duncan?

The family members who went to Arkansas were William Sanders/Duncan, Simeon Sanders and possibly Vandiver Sanders. William died Dec. 28, 1883 in Benton Co., Ark. and is buried at Twelve Corners Cemetery in Benton Co. William changed his name to Duncan in 1867. He had a son named Willoughby who died Dec 18, 1930 Washington County, Ark. He married Rebecca Smith Feb 29, 1872 in Fayetteville. Another son was Riley Newton who died Nov 29, 1940 in Washington Co., and he had married Mary Elizabeth Smith Sep 18, 1875 in Fayetteville. The last son John Morgan died Mar 23, 1952 in Benton Co. (Gravette) and married Laura Sanders Feb 15, 1885. All were born in Indiana and the mother's maiden name was Permilia Jane Hayden (she died in 1864). William also changed the boy's name to Duncan. William later remarried Rachel Clements and they had more children. I have communicated with two of his descendants who now also live in California. William's parents were Joseph Sanders and Nancy Cox. ■

Cornelius Sanders Had Revolutionary War Record

I was pleasantly surprised recently to learn that Wilson County can claim another patriot who served in the Revolutionary War. Cornelius Sanders had been born in Edgecombe (now Wilson) County (N.C.) on March 10, 1762, and "a record of his birth in a book at home which was put down as he has always been informed by his Grand Father on his Mother's side Cornelius Jordan a few hours after his birth". When he grew up he bought the book in which his birth was recorded at the sale of his Grand Father's property after his death and owns it yet.

Cornelius was one of the five sons and three daughters of Thomas Sanders (died testate in 1802) of Edgecombe County and wife Sarah Jordan, daughter of Cornelius Jordan, Sr., who settled a little west of Wilson before 1750 and died testate in Edgecombe County in 1793/4, leaving an estate of 1,240 acres. This family of Jordans may have originated from Nanesmond County (Va.), but I am inclined to believe the Sanders family traces back over three hundred years to Isle of Wight County in Virginia.

In January or February of 1781 Cornelius Sanders volunteered for a tour of three months under Capt. Etheldred "Dred" Philips and Major Curlee in Col. Thomas Hunter's Regiment. They marched to Halifax and then towards Hillsborough, but before they arrived Curlee left and also Colonel Hunter "owing to having his house burned."

In early June Captain Philips was elected Major and was replaced by Capt. Axum Philips. General Thomas Eaton then marched their force of about 2,000 men through Hillsborough and joined General Nathaniel Greene's Army a few miles further, continuing to pursue the British Army until the Battle of Guilford Court House on March 15, 1781, in which Sanders "was in sight of Genl. Stephens (of the Virginia Militia) at the time said General got his thigh broke and horse killed under him.

After that battle Sanders marched with the American troops to Ramsey's Mills on Deep River and remained until his three months expired and he was discharged. A few weeks after returning home, about May, he was placed in a Company of twelve-months men and

marched under Major John Armstrong from Halifax to join General Greene "within four or five miles pf Camden," where his group was attached to Captain Joshua Hadley's Company, Colonel Pinketham "Pink" Eaton's Regiment. Majors at various times were Thomas Hogg, Joseph Dixon, Anthony Sharp, and John Armstrong. They "marched to a little town called Charlotte, and reconnoitered about Charlotte and Camden some time" before besieging the British garrison at their fort in Ninety Six for three to five weeks. Colonel Eaton was killed during this time with a small group attempting to divert the British attention.

Sanders and eight or ten other soldiers were taken sick just before the battle of Eutaw Springs and were treated at the Sparks home during and after the battle. He was discharged there at the end of his term of service but "had not recovered his health and was scarcely able to walk." It was a month or more before he arrived at his home. He estimated his total time of service at sixteen months.

On his second "tour" of duty he had been "employed as a drummer" and served variously under Capt. Joshua Hadley and Capt. William Lytle. He had known Capt. Benjamin Coleman, Capt. William Armstrong, Capt. Hatcher, Colonel Mabrey, Col. William Washington, and Col. Henry Lee of the Light Horse. He had seen General Martin and "was also acquainted with Genl. Greene the Commander of the division."

Sometime after the war ended, Cornelius Sanders moved to Nash County but decided in 1808 to continue onward to Rutherford County, Tennessee, where he had settled near the Wilson County

line and "remained ever since."

On October 25, 1832, he made his mark "C" on the petition before Judge James C. Mitchell of Wilson County for a Revolutionary War Pension under the Act of June 7, 1832. It was approved at \$53.33 per year on March 21, 1833, and was retroactive to March 4, 1831. I have not examined the final settlement made at the time of his death, but I suspect that it will prove that one of his heirs was Isaac Sanders (Apr 8, 1793 - Apr 9, 1868) of Rutherford County but, according to the Census of 1850, a native of (Wilson County?) North Carolina.

The above story was sent in by Mary Harris, 857 Cornish Drive, San Diego, CA 92107-4249. She counts Cornelius Sanders among her ancestors. ■

Lee Hoover, P. O. Box 125, Centerville, TN 37033-0125, [hooverdo@juno.com]. My ancestor, Berryman Sanders, b. 1812/13 near Vernon, Hickman Co, Tenn., married Elizabeth "Betsy" Tubbs. Where and when?? Betsy is believed to be the daughter of Samuel Tubbs, who had a plantation in Attala Co., Miss., according to the 1840 census. Berryman and Betsy had a son, Wiley McDonald, b. July 1837 in Attala Co. Was he an only child? Very unusual unless the mother dies at that birth and I'm told Betsy died in 1843. Who was the Betsy Sanders, head of household on 1840 Attala Co. census? There were 2 adult females, 1 male under 5, (Wiley McD.?) 2 males between 5-10, 1 female under 5, 1 female between 5-10 in that home. No record of Berryman in Attala Co. or Tenn. census in 1840. Berryman was back in Hickman Co., Tenn. by 1846 as he married Naomi T. Williams of Whitfield, Hickman Co. in that year. Wiley refused to live with them and in 1850 was living with a Methodist minister, William Briggs, and attending school. Briggs family are no relation that can be found. Does anyone have information on the Mississippi Sanders/Saunders? Wiley McDonald had close ties with someone in Miss. (who?) although he lived in Hickman Co. except when fighting in the Civil War. Will share any info I have on file. ■

Naming Patterns Can Be A Tremendous Help in Linking Or Identifying Families

The Fall 1996 issue of *The Upper Cumberland Researcher* contained the following note from *The Leftwich Heritage* on common naming practices:

The 1st son was usually named after the father's father.

The 2nd son was usually named after the mother's father.

The 3rd son was usually named after the father.

The 4th son was usually named after the father's eldest brother.

The 5th son was usually named after the mother's eldest brother.

The 1st daughter was usually named after the mother's mother.

The 2nd daughter was usually named after the father's mother.

The 3rd daughter was usually named after the mother.

The 4th daughter was usually named after the mother's eldest sister.

The 5th daughter was usually named after the father's eldest sister.

This pattern was not always followed exactly, but most would usually keep the pattern for the first three children. If there was a name that was found in every generation (example: John, William, Edward, Charles, etc), then somewhere in their children you will surely find these names. If one is stuck on finding parents for an ancestor, try this pattern to give one a suggestion as to a name to search for.

William Saunders, b. 1718 Lancaster Co., Va., and wife Betsy Hubbard

Saunders, b. 1721 Lancaster Co. Va., had eleven children and have literally thousands of descendants. Church Minutes Can Yield Valuable Family History

Bobbie E. Payne, 801 W. High, Grand Prairie, TX 75140-1007. My ancestor John Sanders married Rutha Reeves 15 Sep 1795 in Wake Co., N.C. John and Rutha were later members of the Phillips Mill Baptist Church, Washington, Ga. Microfilmed minutes show:

"Met in conference April 13, 1811 received by experience John Sanders.

"Met in conference Nov. 9, 1911 received by experience Ruth Sanders.

"Met in conference Jan. 11, 1811 ordination of the deacons refered from last conference George Smith & John Sanders were examined and ordained to the office of deacons.

"Met in conference Oct. 10, 1818 Brother John Sanders applies for letter of dismissal for himself and his wife which was granted."

John and Rutha Sanders were on the 1820 and 1830 Lincoln Co., Tenn. census records (as were their daughters Martha Sanders and husband Edmond Ogletree and Mary Sanders and husband Turner Ogletree). Edmund and Martha Ogletree were in Coosa Co., Ala. in 1840 and in Rusk Co., Texas in 1850. Children of Edmund Ogletree and Martha Sanders were Lewis Brantley, John Sanders, Louisa, Rutha, Mary, Jasper Newton, Clarissa, and Martha. Lewis and John remained in Coosa Co., Ala. when Martha and Edmond moved to Texas. ■

Indian War Pensions Can Be Gold Mine

Have you ever requested a bounty land application for someone who served in the Florida Indian Wars? Often they can be a gold mine of information as are other veterans pension or bounty applications that you can request from the National Archives. First, you need to give the veteran's name, place where enlisted, what specific "war," and his unit's name if you know it.

The following was requested by Don Schaefer (Siftings editor) for Francis E. Sanders, Creek War, Beauchamp's Co., 42 Ala. Mil. (volunteers), as listed with a group of Indian War veterans from Jackson Co., Ala.

Here is what was on the page with the most information:

The State of Alabama, Pike County

On the 28th day of April AD one thousand eight hundred and fifty five.

Before me F B Hurly a Justice of the Peace in said county and state a for said pearsonaly come Barbrey Sanders aged sixty six years a resident of Pike County and State of Alabama and being duly swon according to law declares that she is the widdow of Francis E Sanders desseast who was a private soldier in the

company of volunteers commanded by Captan Beechum in the regiment of militia command by Col Curry in the war of 1836 that her said husband volunteered in Barbor County in the State of Alabama on or about the first of May 1836 and continue in actual service about one month and ten days and was honorably dischord at Eufalla about the first of July 1836. She further states that she was marred to the said Frances E Sanders in Lexington Destret South Carolina the first day of Oct 1805 by Esqr Williams as appears by family record and that her name before marriage was Barbrey Oswalt and that her said husband dide in Pike County Alabama the 9th day July 1852 and that she is now a widdow and has never received bounty land under this nor any other act of congress. She makes the declaration for the purpose of obtaining the bounty land to which she may be entitled under the act approved March 3rd 1855.
