Were Your Sanders or Saunders Among Bushwhackers and Guerrillas in Missouri?

The following is taken from pages 383-384 of the book, *Branded as Rebels*, by Joanne Chiles Eakin and Donald R. Hale. It is a list of bushwhackers, guerrillas, partisan rangers, confederates, and southern sympathizers from Missouri during the war years. It was printed by Wee Print of Independence, Mo. and was copyrighted in 1993 by Joanne Chiles Eakin and Donald R. Hale.

Sanders, ____. At Lawrence, August 21, 1863. He was killed on December 28, 1864 near Lexington, Missouri. Ref: *Western Journal of Commerce*, January 2, 1864.

Sanders, Alfred. Died of disease while a POW at the Rock Island, Illinois Military Prison on December 16, 1864. Ref: Ingmire.

Sanders, Benjamin. Ex-guerrilla who, along with others, was captured in Audrain County and brought to Palmyra. He was jailed, indicted for murder and robbery in May 1865. In July arraigned for trial. Granted a change of venue, he was sent to Lewis County and placed in the Monticello jail. Here the men escaped the following November. Only one of the men was recaptured and sent to the State Penitentiary for 12 years. [See Ned Freeman] Ref: Marion, 1884.

Sanders, Charles. With Quantrill. At Lawrence, August 21, 1863. He was killed in 1864 at the house of Mrs. Richard Kinney in Jackson County, Missouri. Ref: Jackson County Historical Society Archives, Box 192; Jeanie White.

Sanders, Daniel W. Died in Gratiot Prison of rubeola. Ref: *Missouri Republican*, November 7, 1862.

Sanders, James. With Quantrill. Orderly Sergeant to Archie Clements. Ref. O.R.; JCHS Archives; Jeanie White.

Sanders, Tid. Killed in the Spring of 1864. [This was probably Theodore Sanders.] Burch said "Capt. Todd ordered his men back, with three of them, Babe Hudspeth, Bill McQuire & Tid Sanders so badly wounded they were unable to go further." Ref: Trow; Block; Burch; Jeanie White; George in *The Georges, Pioneers & Rebels*. . . .

. . . **Saunders, Lonzo.** Confederate or guerrilla (?) who was shot in the early part of April in 1862. John Keshler who was also named in the letter was with Quantrill. The scrap of an unsigned letter giving the news was located in the Blue Mills Day Book, written on a blank page after the mill was shut down during the war. The mill was located west of Sibley in Jackson County. It was the search for the story on "a boy named Saunders" that launched this writer into the field of Civil War research. A story handed down from generation to generation was told to me in 1956 by Mary Perrin Walker, a child of one of those

Ardeth Files Gets Some Saunders History From Great Aunts

"History of the Saunders Side of My Family," submitted by Ardeth Saunders Files, 1206 Goldenrod Drive, Garland, TX 75043-1829, <ardflute@aol.com>.

J. B. (James Baldwin) Saunders (b. 16 Mar 1812 Franklin Co., Va., d. 10 Mar 1899) married Emeline G. Farr (b. 19 Jul 1809 Sumner Co., Tenn., d. 30 Apr 1887) on 20 Sep 1830. James Baldwin's mother's name was Angeline Baldwin. She died of stomach trouble. James Baldwin's middle name was his mother's maiden name. James Baldwin Saunders and Emeline G. Farr lived in the Ashley, Ill. area. They had seven children: four boys and three girls. Their names were James Jay, Don Wiley, John Chapman, Dwight, Elizabeth, Anna, and Berry.

James Jay Saunders was the oldest and had to quit school to help with the family. He was a graduate of Southern Illinois University. He wanted to become a doctor so he started studying in the medical field. He was always reading books about medical issues and health related concerns. He was born 11 Aug 1872 in Tamaroa, Ill.

John Chapman was nicknamed "Chap." Dwight worked for the railroad and was on the Railroad Grievance Committee. He was killed by a disgruntled employee at the age of 52. He had epilepsy. Elizabeth Saunders married Bennett Caine. Anna married Walter Reed.

James Jay Saunders married Ora Beatty at French Lick, Ind., in Orange County 30 Mar 1904. The wedding ceremony was held in the home of the bride. Rev. C. L. Griffith, pastor of the First Methodist Church of French Lick performed the ceremony. Following the wedding, the couple moved to East St., Louis, Ill., where they lived and raised a family. They had six children: Donald Ellsworth, Lucille, Baby "Charles Ralph" who died in infancy at about 4 1/2 months of age, Margie, Frank, and Charlotte Ann. James Jay was employed as a railroad switchman and was a member of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen for many years. After being disabled from that line of work, he became employed by the Certain-teed Products Corp. He and his wife, Ora, were members of First Christian Church. Ora was a member of the Eastern Star and the Ladies Auxiliary to the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainman.

Ora Beatty was the daughter of James Beatty and Susan Eliza Dillard. (James Beatty and Susan Eliza Dillard were married 20 Jun 1876 in Indiana.) Ora was born 11 Oct 1878. This was her father's second marriage. Her mother had also previously been married to a man named Nathan Gass. Ora had one brother named Ellsworth Beatty and two half siblings who were all older than her. One was named Alonzo Gass and the other was Clara. Alonzo married Amelia. Ellsworth married Anna at Massens at Big Springs.

Ora Beatty's half brother, Alonzo, owned and operated a hotel called the "French Lick Hotel." Ora worked for

him at the hotel. She was working as a waitress there the first time she met James Jay. He was working for the railroad when they met. Many of the men who worked on the railroad would stop and eat at the hotel. The meeting between James Jay and Ora was a chance encounter. He spilled salt on the table and Ora was his waitress and had to clean it up. They fell in love, got married, and he brought her back to East St. Louis with him.

The above information was told to me by my great-aunt Charlotte Saunders Walz on January 3, 1998 and her sister, Lucille Saunders Barbeau, all by telephone. ■

This Joseph Sanders and Nancy Yates Start in Virginia; Descendants in Oregon

We have found that there are many many Saunders/Sanders with the same first names, making it a real chore to sift through pertinent data to find our ancestors. The following is what we know of their earliest beginnings:

Joseph Sanders (and nine sisters & brothers were born in Virginia) year? He married Nancy Yates (b. Deer Creek Twp., Pickaway Co., Ohio). Their children: Marcus Brown (b. 18 Dec. 1842); James M. (b. 1834-35 Ohio); Martha Elizabeth (b. 24 Jan 1838); Ann Elizabeth (b. 13 Sep 1838 Ind.); Emmeline (b. 1829 Ohio); Susanna White (b. 7 Feb 1836 Ohio); and David A. (b. 1843 Arkansas).

My great-great grandfather was James M. Saunders. The family spent some time in Indiana before moving to Arkansas. After their father, Joseph passed away, Nancy Yates Saunders moved the family back to her home town in Deer Creek, Ohio, and to Nevada, Iowa. James and Emmeline did not go with the rest of the family so it can only be surmised that they were out on their own, Emmeline perhaps already married.

James met and married Sabina Evelyn Hicks in February 1867 in Iowa and moved to Oregon. They had ten children: John Hicks (b. 1 Jun 1869), Charles (b. 1870), James D. (b. 1874 or

1875), Frank (b. 1876), Letha Alice (b. 1 Feb 1878), Mark (b. 1879), Susan (b. 1881) [my grandmother], Martha Ellen (b. 22 Sep. 1886), Hubert (b. 1893, killed in France 1918), and Ieta (b. 4 Oct 1891).

We have a fair idea of what and where the family were once they were in Oregon. Our search is for those before and during the Civil War. We have been unsuccessful in finding if James was in the Civil War, but his age would have been right. We have been trying to find Nancy Yates' family, which would seem to be straight forward research as we do have where she was born, but no birth date. And we need the names and birth/death dates of her father and mother. ■

present that day in 1862. "One day, early in the war, a group of Federal soldiers came up to the door of grandmother's [Mrs. Joel Franklin Chiles] house and the Captain ordered grandmother to feed the horses and also the soldiers. She told him she had only enough corn left for themselves, but the Captain ordered the horses fed anyway. She also cooked a meal for the men. The children were all standing around the table wide-eyed when the Captain leaned back on his chair and arrogantly announced, 'I just killed your son over in yonder woods.' Grandmother did not give him the satisfaction of being shocked as she knew that her sons were away in the southern army at the time. The man they had shot was a boy by the name of Saunders. A nephew of grandmother's probably Billy Chiles, had been hiding the boy in the woods since he was wounded. The events of that day left a lifetime impression on the children." The relative who told me the story could shed no further information, just that someone had lost his life that fateful day in Grandmother's woods. Twenty five years later, I saw the unfinished letter in the Blue Mills Day Book. Ref: JCHS Archives; Eakin.

Saunders, C.D. With Quantrill's Independent Company. Name appears on the regular CSA roll, Little Rock Hotel Hospital, Little Rock, Arkansas. Admitted December 31, 1862. Returned to duty March 9, 1863. Ref: National Archives microfilm 322, Roll 193.

Saunders, Charles. With Quantrill. Killed in Jackson County, Missouri in March of 1865. Ref: Edwards; CSRJC; Brownlee & Block [said he was killed in 1864 at Hopewell Church in Lafayette County, Missouri.]

Saunders, Daniel W. With Poindexter, died of disease while a POW at St. Louis, Missouri on November 7, 1862. Ref: CSRJC.

Saunders, John H. George W. King testified "That John H. Saunders said that they had the Federals whipped and that the South would raise the black flag and finish it; that he would, if he had his will, cut all the Federal soldiers' throats." Rejected voter in Ft. Osage Township, Jackson County in 1866 because of southern sympathies. Lived in Sibley in 1860. He was born in Kentucky. Ref: K.C.G., Vol. 21, #1.

Saunders, Lewis. He was a soldier in

Saunders, Theodore. Commander of one of the six companies made up of mostly Macon County men for the Confederacy. Ref: Macon.

Help Solve Mystery of Mary Sanders in Pennsylvania

The scarcity and inaccuracy of available information concerning the parentage and ancestors of Mary Sanders is somewhat a mystery. This mystery is heightened by a documented second marriage by her husband, Joshua Duffield Mitchell, on 28 Jul 1829 in Lancaster Co., Pa., four decades prior to the reported death date (1870) of Mary Sanders and the unknown location of her final resting place.

Joshua Mitchell was born in Philadelphia, Pa. 29 Jan 1786. About 1805, he relocated to Lancaster County and later to Centre Co., Pa. He married Mary Sanders in 1808 and Elizabeth Steinberg in 1829 in Maytown, Lancaster County. Two of his sons, Joseph Burden Mitchell and Thomas Duffield Mitchell, moved to Baltimore County, Maryland around 1840. Can anyone identify the parents of this Mary Sanders? ■

Lemuel S. (above) married Viana Raper in North Carolina. Their children were: Charles L., died 25 Jan 1905 Ray, Okla.; Samuel L.; Elsie Elizabeth; John Franklin Monroe. This family ended up in Adair Co., Okla. outside of Stilwell, Okla. I have located their burial sites except for Charles. He was reputed to have been an attorney and partner of W.W. Keeler. He was a senator for Cherokee Nation and graduated from the Male Seminary in Tahlequah, Okla. Charles married Magdeline Zena Pense, b. 3 Mar 1880, d. Jan 1900 at Ray, Okla.

Charles and Magdeline had three children: Dewey, died in infancy; Franklin Lee (my grandfather), born in Melvin or Ray, Indian Territory, (now Okla.) on 18 Nov 1897 or 18 Oct /1897. Died on 15 Mar 1955, in Seattle, Wash. He married my grandmother, Frankie Jediah Reasonover, and they had five children. ■

He was born 13 Mar 1875 (probably in Kentucky) and died 1955 in White Co., Ill. He was married to Lillie Mae Phelps. They had 11 children: Mattie, Ras, Frank, Bessie, John Henry, Vernie (b. in Morganfield, Ky.), Vena (b. in Bowling Green, Ky.), Thomas (b. in Middlesboro, Ky.), James (b. in Bowling Green, Ky.), Beulah (b. in Uniontown, Ky.), and Clyde (b. in White Co., Ill.). If you are looking for the name SANDERS, one place you will see it quite often is on the back of a football or basketball uniform just above the number. Most all of them are African-American. Were there many, many slave owners named Sanders? How do African-Americans with the name Sanders do genealogical research when their forefathers were listed on records as *property* rather than *real people*?

We are all indebted to what Alex Haley did with his book, *Roots*, and the impetus it gave our hobby. We wonder if his account, based a great deal on oral history, would hold up to the "proof" that

SANDERS Family History Newsletter, a newsletter about descendants of Carry Sanders. Clare is searching for parents of Carry Sanders and anyone connected with this line of African-American Sanders.

First Generation: Carry Sanders (b. 1832 in Ga., d. Linden, Cass Co., Texas. He was a farmer. Carry first married Cassy (?). Cassy was born in Georgia, and may have died in either Georgia or Texas. They had the following children: Henry Sanders (b. 1849 Ga.)

Ab/Abb/Albert Sanders (b. 1854 in Ga., d. 15 Nov 1939 in Linden, Texas.

Rena Sanders (b. 1856 in Texas)

Angeline Sanders (b. 1858 in Texas)

Bob "Robin" Sanders (b. 1861 in Texas)

Carry also married Sarah (?). Sarah was born in 1842 in Georgia. They had the following children:

Edmond Sanders (b. 1870 in Texas)

Daniel Sanders (b. 1872 in Texas)

Amanda Sanders (b. 1873 in Texas)

Mollie Sanders (b. 1875 in Texas)

Second Generation:

1. Henry Sanders, son of Carry and Cassy, was a farmer. He married Elsey/Elsy/Elsie Casteel/Castile, daughter of Joseph Casteel/Castile and Sallie (?), in Linden (Cass Co.), Texas. Elsey/Flsy/Elsie Casteel/Castile was born in 1859 in Arkansas. It is not known whether or not

Henry Sanders and Elsey Casteel ever had any children.

2. Ab/Abb/Albert Sanders, daughter of Carry, died on 15 Nov 1939 in Linden, Texas. He married Bettie Owington/Overton/Owens on 26 Jun 1879 in Cass Co., Texas. Bettie was born in Memphis, Tenn. She died on 11 Sep 1928 in Linden, Texas and is buried in Linden. They had the following children: Alberta (b. 1875), Addie (b. 1877), Robert (b. 1879), and Cary "Bud" (b. 2 Sep 1880)

3. Rena married Preston Rose on 11 Apr 1878 in Linden, Texas.

4. Angeline married Nelson Williams on 17 Aug 1879 in Linden, Texas. It is not known whether or not they had children.

Cary "Bud," son of Ab/Abb/Albert above, died on 23 May 1965 in Linden, Texas. He was buried in Macedonia Cemetery, Linden, Texas. His occupation is listed as a common laborer per his death certificate. Bud married Florine Smith on 25 Dec 1901 in Linden, Texas. Florine Smith was born in March 1885 in Texas. She died in Linden and buried in Old Linden Cemetery in the "Colored Section."

Clare Sanders Washington's father is Willie Sanders, one of the ten children of Cary "Bud" Sanders. She has much more information about Carry Sanders' descendants.

Here is someone who must be related to Clare Sanders Washington (above), but they have not found the specific connection:

I am Louise Sanders Asher, 2422 Sonoma Drive, Colorado Springs, CO 80910, <cathreen@uswest.net>, and I am African-American. I have been trying to trace my grandfather Tom Sanders for sometime, but have not been able to find out too much. Most of what I know about him was from my father, John L. Sanders. My father and his other siblings were born in Fulton, Hempstead Co., Ark. sometime between 1895 and 1915. Their father Tom didn't share much about his background, except for the fact that he was from the Sanders Plantation, but never told anyone the exact location. Tom boasted of having had three wives and over thirty children, who were probably spread out all over the south at that time.

Tom met and married Maranda Higgs/Hicks (my father's mother) around 1894. She was said to have been from Louisiana, and was around 25

years old, with three children (Manning Bell, Katie, and George Mitchell). The children she and Tom had together were, Lotinie, Leola, John (my father), Rosie/Rosa Lee, Effie Raymond, and Bessie (all of whom were born between 1898 and 1913). Tom also had several grown sons (Willie, Henry, J.C., and Jack) who came to live with the family at one point.

Tom and his family were sharecroppers (not unlike most families at that time) and moved back and forth between Texas and Arkansas. Tom died around 1926 in Texas (we believe) but have not found any documentation because of no indentifying information, since there are many other Tom Sanders listed on the Texas Death Index. We know that the family lived in Texarkana, Linden, Kildare, Atlanta and Honey Grove, but whether this was with or without Tom, we don't know. In the late 1930s the family, along with their mother relocated to Portland, Ore., and all of them remained there until they died.

The last of which, Effie Sanders Lawrence, died this past January. And although we don't have many facts about Tom Sanders, through our search, we have found that many African-American Sanders men often listed Georgia or South Carolina as their birthplace, even though we realize the census taker may very well asked them where they were "from" instead of asking for the actual place they were born (which makes a big difference). Also, most people I've spoken with who are trying to trace their Sanders relative will agree that the 1830s is about as far back as we can trace (which is the time period when more slaves were traded than any other period in history).

In knowing this, my family and I came to the conclusion that the Sanders lineage (because of photo comparison and other factors) came from one or two men, who may have been brothers or cousins and were used for breeding purposes. For this to happen, there could have only been one plantation where this was done - *The Sanders Plantation*.

Recently, someone (who was also looking for their African-American Sanders ancestor) wrote me with information about a caucasian family named Lassiter who lived in Alabama. These people were known for sending their

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slaves to other family members in other areas. We have since learned the Lassiters were related to the Sanders (Isaac Sanders in particular) who had many slaves. Isaac also lived in Alabama for a time, but I was able to trace him to Georgia, but right now, we're at a standstill, because we haven't been able to get anymore information. Although this is only a theory, we would like some help from those of you who may have any information.

From Sasha Mitchell, 131 Broadway, Ocean Grove, NJ 07756, <sasha@monmouth.com>. I am hoping to locate a Sanders family formerly of Wythe Co., Va., and the surrounding area up to the 1860s. I am descended from Phoebe Sanders, b. about 1845 in Wythe County. She was formerly a slave of Stephen and Lockey Sanders. Phoebe was born 21 Dec 1845. We think Phoebe's mother was named Mary. She was sold in Grayson County and Phoebe was once taken there to visit her. Phoebe was very light skinned.

From Wythe Co., Va. Wills, Book 7, pp 468-471, there was an inventory of the estate of Stephen Sanders dated 24 Jan 1850 that included:

- One Negro man (Mitchell)
- One Negro woman (Ann)
- One Negro girl (Phoebe)

These three were the only Negroes mentioned. When Stephen died he had one child living and one unborn—Stephen and Robert. Stephen Sr's wife was Lockney Walton. By April 1862, Stephen Jr. and Robert were still children. Phoebe married Charles Sayles.

I read in a book entitled *Sanders Saga* that a Sanders descendant, Frances Sanders Eller of Abington, Va., (great-granddaughter of Lockey Sanders) was in possession of "Grandma Lockey's Bible." Frances was a pianist at Virginia Intermont College (in Bristol, Va.). She died 7 Mar 1992 (as best I can tell from a Social Security Death Index find). She had no children. Her sister was named Marion Carleton Eller. Maybe she came into possession of the Bible, or knows where it is. I would like to know if there is any mention (perhaps in the back of the Bible) of slave births, or if there is any record of slave information in the family's possession. Does anyone have information on this family or about Frances Sanders Eller? ■

James Sanders From Halifax Co., Virginia

(Saunders researcher, Mrs. Ann King also told me James and John used the same mark to denote their land.) If James and John are brothers, then James is the son of Robert Saunders, b. abt. 1690, and Miss Spratley. Robert was the son of John Saunders and Sarah Hargrave. John was the son of Edward. ■

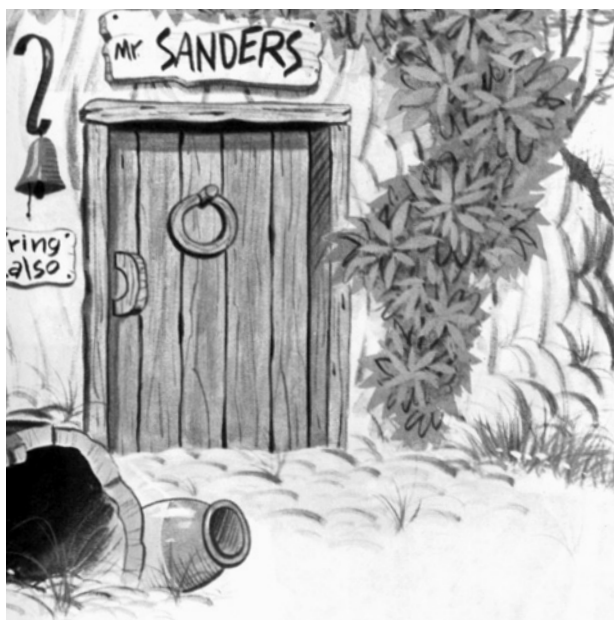

Jerusha and Hezekiah's children were: Rosetta S., b. 24 Oct 1833, N.Y.; Rosina S., b. 5 Dec 1835, N.Y.; Daniel, b. 11 May 1837, Pa.; Charles, b. 5 Mar 1839, Pa.; Jane, b. 6 Dec. 1843, Pa.; James, b. 6 Dec 1843, Pa.; George, b. 12 Nov. 1845, Pa.; John, b. 1849, Pa.; and Albert, b. 25 Oct 1853, Pa.

It is believed that Jane married Royal Sanders. Royal was the son of William Warren and Emma Harris Sanders. Royal's family was also from Erie Co., Pa. and Lake Co., Ind. Royal and Jane came to Salt Lick Twp., Lincoln Co., Kans.; not sure of the year.

Royal's grandparents were Theophilus and Tryphosa Call Sanders, natives of Essex Co., N.Y. Does anyone know if the Royal and Jane Saunders/Sanders families were related to one another before their marriage? ■
